A Curatorial Residency About Heritage and Horizons

Naryn, Kyrgyz Republic 18-25 November 2024

CONCEPT

Artists, curators and cultural managers from **Kyrgyzstan**, **France and Germany** are convening at an **art residency** in the mountainous city of **Naryn** (Kyrgyzstan).

This innovative art laboratory intends to explore the intersection of curatorship, art management, cultural heritage and creation. During the one-week art residency, participants will engage in workshops incorporating practice and reflection and confront points of view and ideas in order to question **the future of curatorship and residency in Kyrgyzstan**. During these sessions, participants will work with traditional techniques while infusing these techniques with contemporary meanings and forms. This "thinking while doing" process will enable attendees to bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical application, fostering a deeper understanding of how art can play a role in cultural preservation and innovation. Merging experiences and innovations from Europe and Kyrgyzstan intends to bring new ideas for future residencies and the experience in Naryn will be a laboratory for these reflections.

This **Art Lab** is an artistic residency and a theoretical workshop at the same time. At the end of the residency, the outputs of the week's creation and reflection will be presented in Bishkek, the capital city of Kyrgyzstan, at an exhibition and conference intending to forecast the future of residencies in the country.

This experimental project intends to be a vibrant exchange of ideas and practices, a pioneering event setting new perspectives, and an intense multicultural adventure.

About Naryn

Naryn, being part of the Silk Road, has historically absorbed materials, thoughts, and imagery from diverse cultures. Participants will have the opportunity to discover Kyrgyz traditional crafts, shaped and upheld over the centuries. Additionally, they will have the chance to meet with craftswomen, visit art institutions, and immerse themselves in the rhythms of Naryn by exploring its markets, strolling through its streets, hiking its mountains, and descending to Naryn river. This deep dive into the local culture intends to **foster cross-cultural creative work by artists from Kyrgyzstan, France and Germany**.

PARTNERS

Launched in 2021, the French-German Cultural Institute project in Kyrgyzstan is driven by the Embassy of France through **Alliance Française de Bichkek** and by the **Goethe-Institut Kirgistan**. Finding its roots in the Aix-la-Chapelle treaty, signed by President Macron and Chancellor Merkel in 2019, it intends to strengthen French-German's strategic partnership and embodies the values of reconciliation, cooperation and cultural exchanges, building new artistic and cultural bonds between France, Germany and Kyrgyzstan. The project relies on its institutional and artistic partnerships, encouraging new cooperation and the development of new cultural perspectives.

Its cultural programme gathers projects organised around three themes: cultural diversity, equality and environment. It stands out for its willingness to explore all cultural fields and create cooperation between creators, researchers and innovators in domains such as music, dance, video games, urban planning and comic strips – and, in this project, with residencies where art meets craftsmanship, cultural management and experimentation. This event will be the first project to be organised in the city of Naryn, thanks to the decisive partnership with UCA.
